About Our Presenters

Elizabeth Bonilla is a chemistry teacher at West Johnston High School in Benson, NC. She grew up in Long Beach, MS and attended the University of Mississippi. Ms. Bonilla said she works with SADD because she knows it is making a difference in her students' lives. She loves being there to support them and watch them grow into adults. She says she knows "this is what I'm supposed to do with my life." Ms. Bonilla lives in Angier, NC with husband Fabri, daughter Reiley and dog Jeter. She is looking forward to the arrival of soon-to-be Baby Number Two.

Aidil Ortiz Hill is the director of YES! (Youth Empowered Solutions), an organization that involves youth in health policy work. A resident of Durham, NC, she is chair of her neighborhood advocacy group, Uplift East Durham. This group successfully lobbied for measures that promote biking, pedestrianism, safety and home ownership. Aidil has a degree in public relations from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and a master's degree in counseling from North Carolina Central University. She has served as a voting rights coordinator for ex-felons. The teens involved in YES! have been nationally recognized through the Campaign for Tobacco Free Kids Youth Advocate of the Year Award and by the OJJDP Enforcing Underage Drinking Laws program.

Regina Ford Hall lives in Winston-Salem. She is a member of the Board of Directors of Partnership for a Drug-Free NC. She graduated from East Carolina University and from Virginia State University with a Master of Science degree in psychology. Regina is the District Liaison for US Congressman Mel Watt in the Greensboro and Winston-Salem offices.

Cameron Houser lives in Hudson, NC where he attended South Caldwell High School. He played baseball throughout high school. Cameron was injured in an automobile crash and had to learn to talk and walk again. Cameron speaks to students and young adults across the state. He recently spoke to young marines at Camp Lejeune Marine Base. The message he wants to get across to young people is that the temporary buzz you get from alcohol or drugs is not worth the risk to your future.

Annette Carrington Johnson is program manager of the Communicable Disease and Maternal Child Health Program in the Durham County Health Department and an adjunct professor at NC Central University. She is a youth educator who views young people as positive assets in the community. She sponsors youth summits, youth conferences and other youth-lead events. She coordinates TEAS (Together Everyone Accomplishes Something), a pregnancy prevention program sponsored by the Durham County Health Department. Annette strongly believes that all youth should be fully informed in order to make healthy, safe decisions in their relationships. She has a Master of Science degree in Health Promotion and Human Science.

Toney Lineberry lives in Virginia where he is an adjunct professor teaching tort law. He also serves as chair of the State Rehabilitation Council. When he was a high school wrestling champion, Toney was involved in a life-threatening automobile crash. He had to learn to live with a permanent disability and, rather than doing it with defeat, he chose to live triumphantly. After his injury, Toney decided he needed to address his problem of not being able to read and write. He subsequently received a full scholarship to the University of Virginia, where he received his Juris Doctor degree. Toney has traveled throughout North America delivering motivational speeches about life, highway safety and staying positive. He has spoken to high school students, corporate and civic organizations and military personnel. His many recognitions and awards include being named one of Ten Outstanding Young Americans (TOYA) by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Virginia Rehabilitant of the Year and a recipient of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration Award for Public Service.

Kevin London lives in Eden, NC. As the result of a tragedy that touched his family, he speaks to groups, schools and churches about the dangers of drinking and driving. He is in the process of outfitting a truck that displays this message. He accompanied Mothers Against Drunk Driving to Washington, DC to meet with the Secretary of Transportation about the need for policy changes to prevent driving while impaired crashes.

Lisa Mozingo lives in Goldsboro, NC, where she is studying human services at Wayne Community College. While a senior at Spring Creek High School in Seven Springs, two weeks before she was to graduate with her twin brother, Lisa was injured in an automobile crash. In addition to maintaining her studies, she travels to school events and churches to speak to young people about the importance of wearing seatbelts when behind the wheel of a vehicle. Lisa has served as spokesperson for NC Click It or Ticket. She loves the outdoors and enjoys hunting.

National Alliance For Youth Development/Motivational Media Assemblies is the international leader in school assembly events. MMA productions have been viewed by over 51 million students in the U.S., Canada, Australia and Taiwan. Featuring clips from today's most popular movies, music videos and incredible sports footage, MMA shows deal with the themes of decision-making, conflict resolution, drug prevention, traffic safety and personal excellence. Garrett Prince lives in Raleigh, NC and works as a restaurant server. He attended Millbrook High School where he played lacrosse and football. During his junior year, he experienced the consequences of a destructive decision that changed his life. The SADD conference is Garrett's first time speaking publicly about his experience.

Streetsafe is a non-profit, charitable initiative taught by police officers, highway patrolmen, firemen, judges, insurance executives and driver education professionals. It is a hands-on driving program designed and developed to change the driving behaviors that cause moving violations, crashes, DWI's, injuries and death. Developed and originated out of Wilmington, NC, StreetSafe has grown to four fully equipped, independent, regional Instructor Groups located in the Triad, Triangle and Southeast regions of North Carolina. It also offers service in South Carolina, Tennessee, Kentucky and Virginia.

Joe Fitzgerald is the assistant director for StreetSafe. He is a former member of the Wilmington Police Department SWAT team, a crash reconstruction expert and a drug specialist. He leads StreetSafe's instruction teams and is their training and education specialist. Joe loves working with students and believes in making them comfortable by creating a fun and effective environment to learn and think differently.

Kim Shovlin handles marketing and public relations for StreetSafe. She is also the event coordinator and program manager.
