### STATISTICAL BULLETIN 2004-2005

#### DISPLACED HOMEMAKER PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women distributes state funding to local county programs to be used for providing services to displaced homemakers. In 2004-2005, the Council distributed state funding to thirty-four displaced homemaker programs and to North Carolina Women Work!, the displaced homemaker network that provides technical assistance to the local county programs. The local programs provide job counseling, job training, job placement services, health education, counseling services, and financial management services to displaced homemakers.

- The displaced homemaker programs served 4,609 clients in 2003-2004. The 2004-2005 total represents a 12% decrease in the number of clients served.
- The Wilkes county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (419) followed by Forsyth (410) & Cumberland (356) counties.
- In 2004-2005, 50% of the clients served were white. Blacks comprised 41% of the clients while 5% of the clients were Hispanics.
- The 35-44 age group comprised the largest group served by the local county programs.
- Single clients comprised 28% of the total number served.
- Women comprised 96% of the clients served in 2004-2005.
- Of the total number of clients served, 18% obtained full time employment while 12% obtained part time employment.
- Information/Referral and Follow-up services comprised the largest services provided by the local programs.
- Of the total number of clients served, 22% were placed in a four year college, community college, or trade course.
- Of the total number of clients that received an education placement, 71% were placed in a community college.

#### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women distributes state funding to local county programs for victims of domestic violence and to the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence which provides technical assistance to the programs. Funding is provided to domestic violence programs in all 100 North Carolina counties. Each local county program provides a 24-hour confidential crisis hotline, crisis intervention services, referrals to other community resources as needed, emergency shelter or shelter referral, advocacy, counseling, and community education.

- The domestic violence programs served 45,743 clients in 2003-2004. The 2004-2005 total represents a 10% increase in the number of clients served.
- The Buncombe county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (2,400) followed by Wake (2,241) & Randolph (1,982) counties.
- Whites comprised 55% of the total number of clients served by the local county programs.
   Blacks comprised 26% of the total number of clients served while Hispanics accounted for 9%
- In 2004-2005, 32% of the clients served were in the 45-54 age group. The 35-44 age group comprised 20% of the total number of clients served.
- Women comprised 87% of the total number of clients served while men comprised 13%.
- A majority of services provided by the programs included distributing information to clients followed by referring the clients to other organizations for additional assistance.
- In 2003-2004, the local programs received 94,600 calls on the 24-hour crisis lines. In 2004-2005, 104,063 calls were received, representing a 10% increase in volume.
- In 2003-2004, 756 clients were referred to other shelters due to a lack of space. Referrals increased in 2004-2005 by 9%.

#### SEXUAL ASSAULT PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women distributes state funding to seventy-five local county programs for victims of sexual assault and to the North Carolina Coalition Against Sexual Assault which provides technical assistance to the local county programs. Each county program provides a 24-hour confidential crisis hotline, crisis intervention services, referrals to other community resources as needed, emergency shelter or shelter referral, advocacy, counseling and community education.

- In 2003-2004, the local county programs served 7,265 clients. The 2004-2005 total number of clients served represents a 16% increase in the total number clients served.
- The Haywood county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (664) followed by Buncombe (533) & Alamance (443) counties.
- In 2004-2005, whites comprised 60% of the clients served while 20% were black.
- In 2004-2005, 24% of the clients served were in the 26-40 age group.
- Women comprised 87% of the total number of clients served while men accounted for 13%.
- Of the total number of assaults, 25% were child sexual offenses. This is a 31% increase compared to the 2003-2004 child sexual offenses (1,466) reported to the local county programs.
- A majority of clients were assaulted by either an acquaintance or relative while 15% of the clients served did not give this information to the local county program.
- In 2004-2005, 31% of the offenders were a relative of the victim while 35% were an acquaintance.
