

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Office for Historically Underutilized Businesses (HUB Office) serves as an advocate for HUB vendors, which includes minority and women-owned business enterprises, disabled-owned businesses, disabled business enterprises (organizations that employ disabled individuals), and non-profit work centers for the blind and severely disabled. The HUB Office promotes the State's on-line vendor registration and HUB certification/verification process, provides technical assistance, and conducts training on how to conduct business with state government. The HUB Office captures data reflecting the State's HUB utilization and expenditures with state agencies, community colleges, public schools and universities, while also serving as a resource to these agencies.

Executive Order 150 states that North Carolina's Historically Underutilized Business participation goal is <u>at least</u> ten percent (10%), by dollar amount, of the State's purchases of goods and services will be derived from HUB vendors. Executive Order 150 further requires the submission of quarterly HUB purchasing reports to the HUB Office. *The goal for fiscal year 2001-2002 (July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002 remained at 10%.*

During the <u>4th Quarter</u> of fiscal year 2001-02 (April 1, 2002 – June 30, 2002), HUB participation for the State of North Carolina, as reported by the State Reporting Entities, is <u>8.11%</u>. Purchases reported totaled, **\$1,518,061,856** with **\$123,159,807** reported HUB participation.

At <u>Fiscal Year-End</u> 2001-02 (July 1, 2001 - June 30, 2002), HUB participation for the State of North Carolina, as reported by the State Reporting Entities, is <u>7.85%</u>. Purchases reported total **\$5,493,749,153** with **\$431,307,304** reported HUB participation.

Categories of State Reporting Entities responsible for reporting HUB participation are as follows:

- Cabinet Agencies
- Council of State Agencies
- Supporting Agencies
- Community Colleges
- Public School Districts
- State Universities
- State Construction Office

The State Reporting Entities submit a <u>Quarterly HUB Purchasing Report</u> to the Office for Historically Underutilized Businesses. The figures reported include multi-year contracts that may reduce the HUB participation numbers for the year in which the contracts are awarded. Reports are due no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter and reflect each entity's HUB purchases within the following categories:

- Term Contracts
- Commodities
- Service Contracts
- Construction Expenditures (that which is under the entities' delegation; but not captured by the State Construction Office.)

During fiscal year 2001-2002 (July 1, 2001 – June 30, 2002), two major pieces of legislation affected the operations of the HUB Office. The first was the statutory establishment of the HUB Office, which occurred as a result of Senate Bill 1005, The Appropriations Bill (Session Law 2001-424.) Senate Bill 1005 codified the establishment of HUB Office by placing its existence into legislation. Prior to this legislation, the HUB Office was established and existed only through Executive Order 150, signed by Governor James Hunt in 1999. Although a "Minority Business/HUB Program" has existed for over twenty years, it was through Executive Order 150 that the "Office for Historically Underutilized Businesses" was established and placed in the Secretary of Administration's Office in 1999. While Senate Bill 1005 became retroactively effective July 1, 2001, it was ratified by the North Carolina General Assembly on September 21, 2001 and signed by Governor Michael F. Easley on September 26, 2001.

The second piece of legislation that significantly impacted the HUB Office was Senate Bill 914, Changes to Laws Governing Public Construction (Session Law 2001-496). On December 6, 2001, the General Assembly enacted Senate Bill 914. The bill was signed by Governor Michael F. Easley on December 19, 2001 and became effective January 1, 2002. Senate Bill 914 affords flexibility in the public construction bidding process, provides significant new requirements for promoting the recruitment and utilization of minority contractors, as well as documenting and reporting good faith efforts to that end. To carry out the mandates of SB914, the HUB Office received an expansion of staff with five (5) new positions and received a non-recurring and recurring funding to support the responsibilities associated with SB914.

The following legislation also addresses the State's minority business goals and reporting requirements:

G.S. 143-48 (b) states "in part".... "That every governmental entity required by statute to use the services of the Department of Administration in the purchase of goods and services and every private, non-profit corporation other than an institution of higher education or a hospital that receives an appropriation of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) or more during a fiscal year from the General Assembly **shall report".**

G.S. 143-128.2 states "in part".... "The State shall have a verifiable **ten percent (10%)** goal for participation by minority businesses in the total value of work for each State building project, including building projects done by a private entity on a facility to be leased or purchased by the State".

At **year-end**, the Cabinet Agencies reported **10.21%** HUB participation. The Agencies reported a total of **\$2,166,527,878** in purchases with **\$221,108,325** reported HUB participation.

At **year-end**, the Council of State Agencies reported **5.45%** HUB participation. The Agencies reported a total of **\$98,930,951** in purchases with **\$5,394,502** reported HUB participation.

For **4**th **Quarter**, the Supporting Agencies reported **18.44%** HUB participation. The Agencies reported a total of \$31,247,741 in purchases with \$5,762,629 reported HUB participation.

Year-End

At **year-end**, the Supporting Agencies reported **10.38%** HUB participation. The agencies reported a total of **\$105,859,988** in purchases with **\$10,984,890** reported HUB participation.

Community Colleges - 4th Quarter and Year-End (FY 01-02)

100% Reporting Conclusively for 4th Quarter

4th Quarter

For **4**th **Quarter**, the Community Colleges reported **8.04%** HUB participation. The Colleges reported a total of \$44,034,975 in purchases with \$3,539,903 reported HUB participation.

Year-End

At **year-end**, the Community Colleges reported **7.18%** HUB participation. The Colleges reported a total of **\$169,698,958** in purchases with **\$12,188,920** reported HUB participation. In the prior year (FY 00 - 01), a total of 44 out of 59, or 75% of the Community Colleges submitted conclusive quarterly reports all four (4) quarters. Current fiscal year (FY 01 - 02) records 52 of the 59, or 88% of the Community Colleges submitted conclusive reports all four (4) quarters.

NOTE: Seven Community Colleges (Caldwell, Catawba, Guilford, Mayland, Pitt, Anson/South Piedmont and Wayne) are pilot projects for NC Community College Systems' new massive computer information system that will develop new computer programs to manage almost every facet of information services for all 59 institutions in the system. One part of the system generates the HUB report. After an attempt to produce the HUB report for 1st qtr. FYE 01-02, it was noted that the system was picking up erroneous information that should not be included in the report. The seven noted Community Colleges' HUB participation for 1st qtr. (July 1, 2001 – September 30, 2001) is not included in this report.

Public School Districts - 4th Quarter and Year-End (FY 01 - 02)

79% Reporting Conclusively for 4th Quarter

4th Quarter

For **4**th **Quarter**, the Public School Districts reported **4.98%** HUB participation. The Public School Districts reported a total of \$434,622,159 in purchases with \$21,648,389 reported HUB participation.

Year- End

At **year- end**, the Public School Districts reported **5.46%** HUB participation. The School Districts reported a total of **\$1,654,477,462** in purchases with **\$90,275,784** reported HUB participation. In the prior fiscal year (FY 00 - 01), a total of 52 of the 117, or 44%, of the Public School Districts submitted conclusive quarterly reports all four (4) quarters. Current fiscal year (FY 01 - 02) records a total of 77 of the 117, or 66%, of the Public School Districts submitted conclusive quarterly reports all four (4) quarters. The HUB Office recognizes a 48% increase from the previous year in the number of Public School Districts reporting conclusively all for quarters. We attribute this significant increase to concerted outreach efforts and training provided by the HUB Office. We commend the Public School Districts for their continued efforts with HUB reporting.

State Universities - 4th Quarter and Year-End (FY 01 - 02)

100% Reporting Conclusively for 4th Quarter

4th Quarter

For 4th Quarter, the State Universities reported **5.46%** HUB participation. The Universities reported a total of \$224,340,180 in purchases with \$12,243,920 reported HUB participation.

Year- End

At **year-end**, the State Universities reported **5.72%** HUB participation. The Universities reported a total of **\$828,204,996** in purchases with **\$47,398,430** reported HUB participation. In the prior year (FY 00 - 01), a total of 14 of the 19, or 74%, of the State Universities submitted conclusive quarterly reports all four (4) quarters. Current fiscal year (FY 01 - 02) records 100% (a total of 19) of the Universities submitted conclusive quarterly reports all four (4) quarters. We attribute this significant increase to concerted outreach efforts and training provided by the HUB Office. The HUB Office wishes to commend the universities for their continued efforts with HUB reporting.

State Construction Office - 4th Quarter and Year-End (FY 01 - 02)

4th Quarter

The State Construction Office (SCO) reported **10.97%** HUB participation. SCO reported a total of \$152,649,418 in purchases with \$16,739,215 reported HUB participation.

Year-End

At **year-end**, SCO reported **9.35%** HUB participation. SCO reported a total of \$470,048,919 in purchases with \$43,956,453 reported HUB participation.

Prior year (FY 00-01) reflected one hundred forty-two (142) of the State's two hundred twenty-seven (227), or (63%) of the reporting entities, reporting conclusively all four quarters. Current year (FY 01-02) reflects one hundred eighty (180) of the reporting entities reporting conclusively all four quarters. The HUB Office recognizes a twenty-seven percent (27%) increase in reporting entities from the prior year.

SUMMARY OF REPORTING ENTITITES

The following illustrates the State Reporting Entities that met or exceeded the State's 10% goal at fiscal year end 2001 - 2002.

Cabinet Agencies:

Five (5) of the ten (10), or **50%** of the Cabinet Agencies, met or exceeded the State's goal, with **Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention** at **22.82%**, **Correction** at **18.81%**, **Cultural Resources** at **18.10%**, **Administration** at **13.55%**, **Crime Control & Public Safety** at **13.27%**. One (1) additional Cabinet Agency, (Department of Transportation) was close to meeting the goal with 9.76% reported HUB participation. (see page 3-2)

Council of State Agencies:

Three (3) of the nine (9), or **33%** of the Council of State Agencies, met or exceeded the State's goal, with the **Office of the State Auditor** at **12.56%**, **State Treasurer's Office** at **11.96%**, **and the Department of Insurance** at **11.86%**. Two (2) additional Council Agencies were close to meeting the goal with Department of Justice at 9.85% and Department of Labor at 9.64%, reported HUB participation. (see page 3-3)

Supporting Agencies:

Seven (7) of the twelve (12), or **58%** of the Supporting Agencies, met or exceeded the State's goal, with the **N.C. Institute of Minority Economic Development** at **70.27%**, **Administrative Hearings** at **17.45%**, **Information Technology Services** at **14.12%**, **Administrative Office of the Courts** at **13.97%**, **Ports Authority** at **12.82%**, **General Assembly** at **11.80%**, **and the Office of State Controller** at **10.05%**. One (1) additional Supporting Agency, (Employment Security Commission) came close to meeting the goal with 9.38% reported HUB participation. This represents a 40% increase from the previous year. (see page 3-4)

Community Colleges:

Seventeen (17) of the fifty-nine (59), or **29%** of the Community Colleges, met or exceeded the State's goal. This represents an 89% increase from the previous year. (see page 3-5)

Public School Districts: (of those reporting conclusively all four quarters)

Twenty-one (21) of the one hundred seventeen (117), or **18%** of the Public School Districts met or exceeded the State's goal. This represents a 163% increase from the previous year. (see page 3-6)

State Universities:

Seven (7) of the nineteen (19), or **37%** of the Universities, met or exceeded the State's goal. This represents a 17% increase from the previous year. (see page 3-7)

Prior year (FY 00-01) records thirty-eight (39) of the state's two hundred twenty-seven (227) reporting entities meeting the state's ten percent (10%) goal. Current year (FY 01-02) records sixty (60) of the reporting entities meeting the state's ten percent (10%) goal. The HUB Office recognizes a fifty-four percent (54%) increase from the prior year.

The State's **Year-To-Date** (July 1, 2001 - June 30, 2002) HUB participation rate is at **7.85%.** The Office for Historically Underutilized Businesses wishes to impress upon all reporting entities the need to continue to make concerted efforts to increase the total amount of goods and services acquired from HUB vendors.

OUTREACH

During the year, the HUB Office continued to undertake aggressive outreach efforts to inform HUB vendors and purchasing officials of the HUB Program, Vendor Link, State's New E-Procurement Initiative, \$3.1 Billion Higher Education Bond, Executive Order 150 and Public Construction legislation S.B. 914 (G.S. 143-128.2 and G.S.143-128.3). The HUB Office conducted, facilitated or participated more than eighty (80) conferences, workshops, seminars, training sessions or presentations for purchasers and HUB vendors, sponsored eight (8) HUB E-Procurement Training Sessions at 6 locations across the State; and handled four thousand (4,000) inquires from the general public, HUB vendors/contractors, purchasers, state agencies and other public entities.

ACTIVITIES

A review of highlights and significant activities of the Office for Historically Underutilized Businesses include:

- Cabinet Agencies, collectively, exceeded the State's 10% goal with reported yearend participation of 10.21%.
- Supporting Agencies collectively exceed the State's 10% goal with reported year-end participation of 10.38%.
- 27% increase from the previous fiscal year of HUB reporting entities reporting conclusively all four quarters.
- 54% increase, from prior year, in the number of reporting entities meeting the State's 10% goal.
- Handled over 4000 inquiries from HUB vendors/contractors, state agencies and other public entities by providing assistance and/or information on the State's HUB Program, HUB Certification\Verification, E-Procurement, Purchasing and Construction Opportunities, Senate Bill 914 (G.S. 143-128.2) and HUB Reporting requirements.
- Certified\Verified 574 vendors as HUB vendors during the year through Vendor Link, with a total of 3956 certified\re-certified\verified HUB Vendors in the Vendor Link database.
- Assured that HUB issues, matters and concerns were in the forefront of the State's new E-Procurement Initiative.
- Assured that HUB issues, matters and concerns were in the forefront of the State's \$3.1 Billion Higher Education Bond Referendum.
- Sponsored and coordinated eight (8) HUB E-Procurement Training Sessions at six (6) sites across the State to promote the State's new E-procurement system. Locations included Winston-Salem, Asheville, Wilmington, Raleigh, Charlotte and Lumberton.

April 3, 2002	Community College System Strategic Planning Meeting on topics for Business Finance Officer Annual Conference (Raleigh, NC - Wake County) Attended the Strategic Planning Meeting sponsored by NC Community College System to review topics, discuss new ideas and methods of presenting beneficial material for the Community College Annual Conference that will be held on April 16, 2002. The planning committee focused on reviewing purchasing/reporting methods, ideas on e- procurement system, first hand experience in working with vendor communities, pros/cons of changing purchasing methods and best way to present information to the audience.

The program also allowed for a question and answer period which gave the University Officials an opportunity to hear the concerns that contractors face when trying to obtain contacts with the University. The Outreach program was well attended with approximately fifty-five (55) individual of the contracting community.						

April 11, 2002 Economic Development Olive Hill Community Corporation (Morganton, NC – Burke County) Attended Trade Fair sponsored by Olive Hill Community Economic Development Corporation, Morganton, NC. HUB Certification Officer conferred on how to become certified with the state as a HUB vendor. Executive Director of NC Womens' Business Center and Executive Director of NC Low Income Housing Coalition spoke at the corporation's annual meeting which was held after the trade fair. Other trade fair participants included representatives from Self-Help Credit Union, NC Institute of Minority Economic Development, Rural Center for Economic Development, and several other local financial institutions. Approximately 15 vendors visited the HUB booth to obtain information on conducting business with the State and becoming certified as a HUB vendor.

April 15, 2002 Contacted State Construction Office (SCO) to review Internet Protocol addresses for E-Procurement Training computer set-up scheduled for April 22, 2002 in their office. Obtained address but elected to utilize SCO's equipment already on-site.

> Designed ads for placement in the Challenger, Carolinian and Charlotte Post newspapers promoting E-Procurement Training. Coordinated with Public Information Office and Advertisement Director to meet the advertisement deadline for running the ads in the Wilmington, Raleigh and Charlotte newspaper. Approximately 7 vendors providing goods, services and construction services attended the session from the surrounding community.

HUB Office E-Procurement Training Session – Raleigh / Durham Area

April 22, 2002

NC Education Building (Raleigh, NC – Wake County) Coordinated HUB E-Procurement Training Session sponsored by HUB Office, which was held in the Education Building, State Construction Office's conference room. Two sessions were held, the morning session focused on vendors that provided goods and services and the afternoon session focused on construction related services. The training sessions were one-on-one interactive training sessions, which afforded participants an opportunity to learn how to navigate and register through the eprocurement and e-quote system in smaller group settings. Businesses received coaching and guidance designed to help navigate through the system. For the morning session representative from the Division of Purchase & Contract, were present. Approximately 23 vendors that provide goods and services attended the morning session. Approximately 18 construction related vendors attended the afternoon E-Procurement Training Session. HUB vendors in the following construction related areas attended: Architectural, Painting, Trucking. Project Management, Construction, Grading & Hauling, Headstone and Landscaping Company attended the session. Representatives from Division of Purchase & Contract and Department of Public Instruction were present to meet new vendors participating in E-Procurement training. Piedmont Chapter – Carolinas Minority Suppliers Development April 23, 2002 Council's Monthly Meeting (Raleigh, NC – Wake County) Participated in the Piedmont Chapter's monthly meeting, which was at the Raleigh Convention Center in conjunction with the Raleigh Chamber of Commerce's Small Business Expo. The HUB Director, who serves as chairwoman of the Piedmont Chamber, welcomed and greeted the attendees. The corporate spotlight was Capital Broadcasting Company, whose representative gave an overview of contracting opportunities available on their America Tobacco Project in Durham, NC. Over 30 individuals, minority business firms and purchasing agents, attended the monthly meeting. Senate Bill 914 – Additional Rule Making Requirements - Subcommittee Chairman gave progress reports on the Designer Selection process. April 24, 2002 Carolinas Minority Suppliers Development Council (CMSDC) Board of Director's Meeting (Charlotte, NC – Mecklenburg County) Attended Board of Directors meeting for Carolinas Minority Suppliers Development Council, which was held at the Ben Craig Center in Charlotte, NC. This was the first full Board of Director's meeting of the newly elected board members. The HUB Director serves as the Secretary for the Board of Directors. The meeting focused on reviewing the strategic plan that was put together as a result of the Board of Director's Retreat that was held on April 4 & 5. Approximately 25 members of the board attended.

The University further believes it gives the owner more control over packaging of bids and that by further breaking down the branches of work allows the opportunity to better match the size and capability of minority businesses.

June 26, 2002	Agency for Public Telecommunications (APT) – Turner Construction Company (Raleigh, NC – Wake County) Meeting held in the APT office with representatives of Turner Construction Company, Agency for Public Telecommunications, State Construction Office and the HUB Office. The meeting was convened at the request of Turner Construction who is interested in conducting its Contractor's College statewide. The meeting explored the possibility of teleconferencing the Contractor's College at various sites throughout the state that minority contractors could attend. The company/agency representatives present discussed how the teleconference could be financed in whole or in part by SCO, HUB Office or other prime contractors / resource organizations.

The HUB Resource Center which also staffs two (2) HUB Coordinators will serve as a resource for minority and women contractors, and prime contractors seeking to do business with UNC-Chapel Hill. A walk-thru of the HUB Resource Center was provided and participants heard presentations on UNC-Chapel Hill informal and formal bid process. The HUB Office was instrumental in encouraging the Facilities Department at UNC-Chapel, as well as all of the Universities' departments to hire HUB Coordinators and to look at establishing HUB plan review rooms. Over 75 individuals attended including prime and minority contractors, media, and other minority business development advocates and associations.
